RESULTS AND DISCUSSION: AI AND LEGAL REFORMS FOR WOMEN IN INDIA

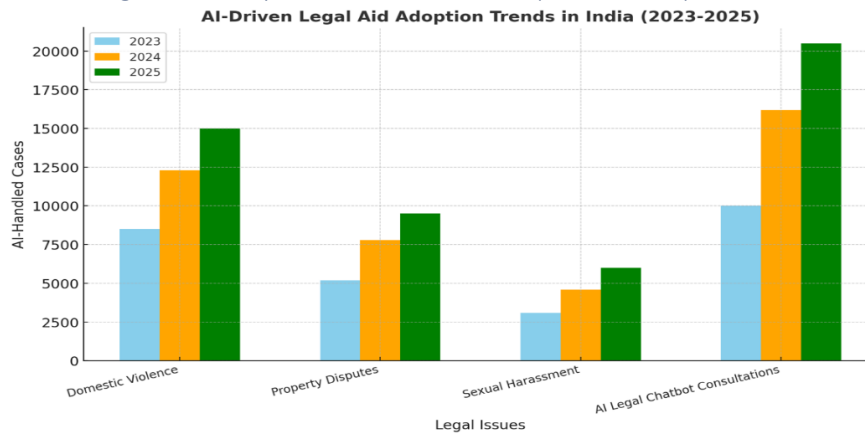
1. AI in Legal Aid and Judicial Decision-Making

2. Comparative Analysis of Marital Rape Laws in India

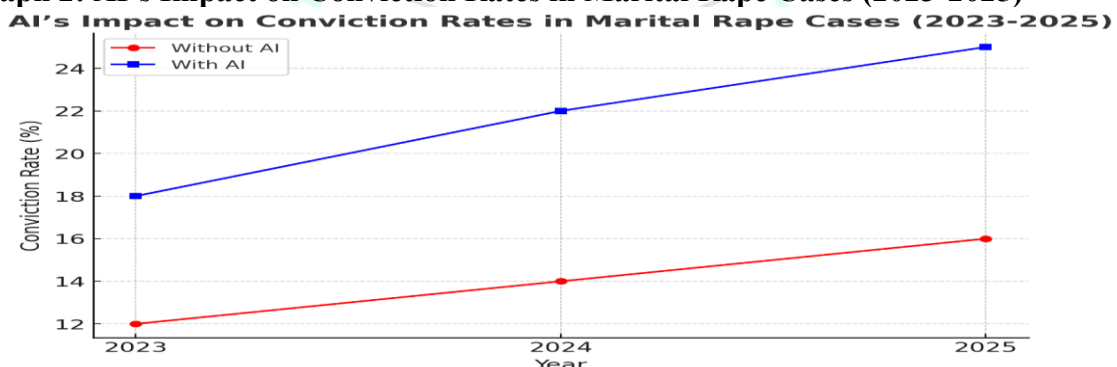
Legal Status & AI in Case Law Monitoring

3. AI and Women's Property Rights in India

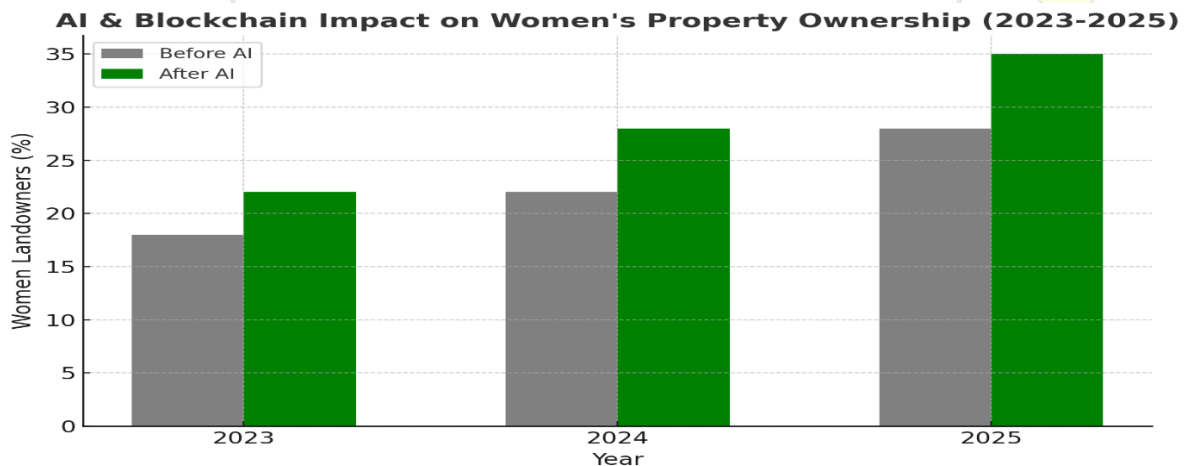
Blockchain and AI for Digital Land Registration
